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### INTRODUCTION

The community of Marin City is comprised of a diverse population that has long been dedicated to promoting vibrant community life through community and cultural events, an abundant array of recreational activities, and supportive programs endorsing health, wellness, and lifelong learning. At the heart of community activity within Marin City is a dedicated group of organizations and programs which aim to serve the educational, recreational, physical, and mental well-being needs of Marin City residents of all ages. The Manzanita Recreation Center campus, which includes the Marguerita C. Johnson Senior Center, Marin City Health & Wellness Center, Manzanita Recreation Gym, Marin City Boxing Gym and Fitness Center, Community Services District (CSD) Offices, Manzanita Children's Center, and the Harriet Tubman House is the home to many of these core programs and organizations.

Despite its role as a key center of community activity and gathering in Marin City, the existing campus and facilities struggle to meet the growing needs of the community. At present, the vastly undersized facility is inefficient and outdated, greatly limiting the potential of the programs and organizations to optimally serve the community and its needs.

Constructed during the mid-20th Century, the Manzanita Recreation Center is close to reaching the end of its lifespan, unless significant upgrades are completed. Several deferred maintenance issues exist within the center including roof leaks, deteriorated siding, dry rot, and corroded mechanical systems. The facility does not comply with current accessibility, energy, structural, and life safety codes. Most existing spaces are inadequately sized for current and proposed uses, such as the gymnasium and the Marin City Health & Wellness Clinic. The Marguerita C. Johnson Senior Center is also limited in its ability to serve the community with its undersized computer lab and multipurpose room, lack of storage capacity to support flexible uses, and inaccessible and non code compliant kitchen. The Harriet Tubman House is currently only available as a storage facility because of its poor connection to the campus and its need of a substantial renovation to address accessibility, energy, structural, and life safety codes as well as deferred maintenance issues.

#### MCCC DESIGN NARRATIVE

Contemporary community centers are able to continually evolve to provide new educational, cultural and social programs along with traditional recreational classes to serve the varied interests and needs of today's populations. Contemporary community centers are designed to meet the needs of the 21st century provide something for everyone, from early childhood education and preschool programs to teen-centric educational and social programs to fitness programs for active adults and seniors. Multi-purpose and multi-generational models are becoming more efficient and flexible to better utilize limited resources and staff. Services for seniors, teens, and children are expanding and

there are an increasing numbers of educational, cultural, social, and community events throughout the calendar. These activities range from small collaborative or social gatherings to larger public meetings and lectures. The new Marin City Community Center will embody these contemporary trends, becoming a welcoming campus and a magnet that brings the community together.

The future Marin City Community Center campus will be transformative, beautiful, and functional, designed to serve and meet the needs of the community for years to come. Through a combination of extensive renovation and new construction, the facilities that house the existing programs and organizations within the Manzanita campus will be significantly upgraded in terms of square footage, quality, functionality, and flexibility. Anchoring the western portion of the site, the Marguerita C. Johnson Senior Center will be renovated and converted into the new home for the Marin City Health and Wellness Center, in addition to providing space for a Family Resource Center.


The recreational focus of the existing Manzanita Recreation Center will be redefined as a community center, offering expanded program opportunities that will better reflect the current needs and opportunities for Marin City residents. These new programs and services will be housed in a renovated and expanded community center facility, containing dedicated training and technology classrooms, meeting spaces, and multipurpose room, in addition to traditional recreational spaces.

At the far end of the site, the historic Harriet Tubman House is planned to provide additional programming space for the campus in an updated and preserved structure. The renovated house could provide office space for community nonprofit organizations or a historical museum. The Manzanita Children's Center portable classrooms will be replaced with a permanent facility, substantially larger in size to allow for program growth and expansion into an Early Childhood Education Center serving infants, toddlers, and school-age children. The site campus concept is central to the master plan, and expands beyond the project site to include the surrounding civic facilities immediately adjacent to the Community Center, including Rocky Graham Park, Martin Luther King Academy, and the Marin Learning Center. Linking pathways, redeveloping Phillips Drive, and enhancing indoor-outdoor connections between the facilities are the key campus site strategies planned for implementation in the master plan.

### **VISION & PROGRAM PROCESS**

During the course of the master plan process, a set of six guiding Core Principles were developed by the project team, defining a vision for the future Marin City Community Center:


- Supporting the *family* as a basis for a *healthy community*
- Preparing young people for successful and fulfilling lives
- Enhancing an *individual's health and wellness* physical and emotional
- *Promoting economic well-being for individuals, households, and the community*
- Recognition of learning opportunities for all age groups, thereby, promoting lifelong learning
- A learning and celebratory showcase of the community's diversity cultural, racial and national origin – for Marin City and all of Marin County

Derived from the extensive participation and community outreach conducted during the initial needs assessment phase, these Core Principles reflect the values of Marin City, which in turn, directly influenced the development of programs and facilities for the proposed Community Center campus. Ultimately, the Center and the CSD will provide integrated services at the campus, partnering with relevant community-based organizations to deliver quality programs that are directly aligned with the six Core Principles.

The methodology for translating the six Core Principles into a building program and physical spaces included a thorough investigation into the following questions:

- What services are currently offered on the Manzanita Recreation Center campus and within the surrounding community?
- What services are lacking within the community, and have the potential to be offered in the future to meet the need?
- Who are the key partners or organizations to provide these needed services?

Through focus groups with stakeholders and district partners, technical meetings with recreational staff, and community meetings, these findings were summarized in a matrix chart, with the various services and partners listed that correspond to each Core Principle. The specific space needs for the facility could then be mapped by determining which physical spaces would support the programs or services as required by each Core Principle. During subsequent phases, the Core Principles also served as a means of evaluation criteria for conceptual site options, accessing each option's ability to meet and embody the Core Principles.


### FACILITY PHASING

Recommended Option

For the preferred master plan option, phasing options for the Community Center and campus have been established. The master plan recommends an approach consisting of three phases. Phases 1 and 2 fulfill near term needs or the "Benefit Now" vision for upgraded facilities and increased programming opportunities to meet the community's immediate priorities. The "Benefit Now" is considered the first generation phase of 15-25 years. An additional third phase, referred to as the Future Phase outlines the full demolition of the existing Manzanita Recreation Center renovation for replacement with a new two-story community center and indoor pool.

### Phase 1 – Recommended Option

Within Phase 1 there are a combination of sub-phase options which can be completed depending on community priority or available funding opportunities. Consequently, Phase 1 can be viewed as a "menu" of options for implementation. Several partner tenants, such as the Marin City Health & Wellness Center and Community Action Marin have the potential to provide individual sources of capital funding for their prospective facilities or programs, allowing those projects to operate on somewhat of an independent track.




The recommended Phase 1 option includes the following elements:

- Construct new gym and CSD offices
- Renovate Senior Center for Health & Wellness Center
- Construct new Early Childhood Education Center
- Renovate Harriet Tubman House

### Phase 2 – Recommended Option

After the completion of Phase 1, the proceeding Phase 2 includes the renovation of the existing Manzanita Recreation Center and the expansion of the existing parking lot. During Phase 2, all programs currently offered in the existing Center would move and operate out of the newly completed gym and CSD offices, until the renovation is complete. This minimizes the loss of revenue generation and the necessity of temporary facilities.



The recommended Phase 2 option includes the following elements:

- Renovate and expand existing community center
- Build new parking lot

### **Future Phase - Recommended Option**

Intended as a second generation phase, the Future Phase includes the eventual demolition of the renovated Community Center portion, with the replacement of a new, two-story community center and indoor pool that connects to the gym and CSD offices through a new lobby.




The Future Phase option includes the following elements:

- Demolish renovated community center portion and build new two-story community center
- Construct indoor pool

### Alternative Option

### **Phase 1 - Alternative Option**

The Phase 1 - Alternative Option addresses the instance where initial funding is secured specifically for an indoor pool facility. In this option, a new gym and CSD offices would be built through an addition to the existing Manzanita Recreation Center, which would remain in its current location. A new indoor pool facility would be constructed in the location of the existing Manzanita Children's Center portable classrooms. In this options, the day care portables would have to be temporarily located off-site, until the reconstruction of the Manzanita Recreation Center. The Harriet Tubman house and Health and Wellness Center renovation in the Senior Center would remain included in this Phase.




Phase 1 – Alternative Option includes the following elements:

- Renovate Senior Center for Health & Wellness Center
- Construct new gym and CSD offices
- Construct new indoor pool facility
- Renovate Harriet Tubman House

### Phase 2 – Alternative Option

The alternative option for Phase 2 provides for the demolition of the existing Manzanita Recreation Center, replacing the facility with a new two-story community center, which would include the Early Childhood Education Center as well as new classrooms, multipurpose space, and boxing and fitness areas.



The recommended Phase 2 alternative option includes the following elements:

- Construct new community center and Early Childhood Education Center
- Build new parking lot

### SITE - CREATING A CAMPUS FOR COMMUNITY-LIFE

The existing and new Community Center site is centrally located within Marin City, surrounded by several civic buildings, which include the Martin Luther King Academy, Marin Learning Center, County of Marin Public Safety Building, Cornerstone Community Church, and the future Rocky Graham Park. The master plan for the Manzanita Recreation Center and the campus includes the new Community Center, Marguerita C. Johnson Senior Center, the Harriet Tubman House, Manzanita Children's Center, and Phillips Drive. The master plan envisions the new campus as the heart of Marin City. At present, the current site layout lacks adequate connections between facilities and hazardous vehicular circulation. The master plan seeks to ameliorate these conditions, while also improving the quality of outdoor public gathering spaces and creating a spatial cohesiveness.


At the center of the campus concept is the redeveloped Phillips Drive. Currently, the portion of Phillips Drive immediately adjacent to the Community Center is a "sea of asphalt," characterized by problematic pedestrian crossings, inefficient parking, and deteriorated paving. The new Community Center master plan includes a proposal for the reconfiguration of Phillips Drive, transforming the street through the addition of continuous angled street parking, sidewalks, street plantings, and raised pedestrian crosswalks. The reimagined Phillips Drive will serve as a new "main street" for Marin City. Through the use of various paving materials and raised pedestrian crosswalks, vehicular traffic will be slowed, and pedestrian crossings between the Community Center and MLK Academy, Learning Center, and Cornerstone Church will be strengthened, reinforcing the campus concept.

The importance of outdoor gathering space in front of the existing Community Center and its "front yard" quality was established early on during community outreach. The renovated and expanded Community Center preserves this central gathering area through the creation of a new public plaza at the proposed main entry to the building, with the plaza directly aligning to the entrance of MLK Academy. A continuous court extends off the plaza along the new face of the CSD Offices, creating a direct connection at grade between the expanded parking lot, new Community Center entry, and gym addition. Utilizing the topography of the site, the continuous court steps down from the gym to Phillips Drive, creating terraced levels for seating and assembly.

A series of pathways traverse the site, linking the Community Center to its immediate neighbors including the renovated Health and Wellness Center, Harriet Tubman House, Early Childhood Education Center, and Rocky Graham Park.

# PARKING - EXTENDING THE CAMPUS CONCEPT TO MEET THE DEMAND

Currently, the existing Manzanita Recreation Center has roughly 41 parking spaces, which does not meet the current parking demand. As the facilities expand and additional programs are added, the demand for parking will only increase. Therefore, the master plan recommends providing a total of 132 parking spaces for Phases 1 and 2, and an increase to 172 spaces in the Future Phase portion of the project. To meet the parking demand of the planned Community Center uses, the master plan proposes three approaches to parking.

During Phase 2, the existing parking lot adjacent to the Community Center will be reoriented and expanded from 18 spaces to 43 spaces. Angled street parking along reconfigured Phillips Drive will provide an additional 40 spaces, significantly reducing the need for a larger surface parking lot directly onsite. Smaller, accessory lots adjacent to the Health & Wellness Center, Early Childhood Education Center, and Harriet Tubman House will provide ADA access and dedicated spaces for each facility. With the addition of 14 parallel parking spaces immediately adjacent to the site along Drake Avenue, a total of 118 "convenient" spaces will be provided for the Community Center.

To further meet the total demand of 132 parking spaces, as well as the 172 spaces needed for the Future Phase, the master plan proposes incorporating shared-use agreements with surrounding facilities within the campus. MLK Academy, Cornerstone Community Church, the People's Inner City Fellowship, and the Village Baptist Church can provide an additional 150 spaces for peak event parking, allowing for a total of 270 parking spaces. An integrated, campus-approach to parking ensures efficient utilization of existing parking resources for the Community Center and surrounding facilities. The developed shared-use agreements will guarantee that all lots are properly coordinated with the individual facilities' own parking requirements and demand to compliment the Community Center uses.

### THE TRANSFORMED COMMUNITY CENTER CAMPUS: BUILDINGS, PLACE, AND ORIENTATION

### Phases 1 & 2

Phases 1 and 2 of the master plan proposes increasing the existing Manzanita Recreation Center from 16,990 square feet to a total of 30,440 square feet. The significant transformation of the existing recreation center will be achieved through a combination of extensive renovation and new construction, with much of the original building footprint remaining unchanged. The existing gymnasium will be subdivided and renovated to accommodate a new multipurpose room and classroom space, with the kitchen and restroom core reconfigured for better efficiency. Through the addition of a new central lobby, lounge, meeting room, classroom, and CSD offices off the front of the former building, the facility will be more efficient and better equipped to meet community needs. 12,075 square feet gym will extend off the renovated boxing area, occupying the former grassy open area to the east. The gym will be orientated to preserve the existing cypress tree hedgerow. Buffered by outdoor courtyards, plazas, and terraces, the new building's interior spaces have the opportunity to expand out into the surrounding campus. To better engage the street, the new construction will extend south towards Phillips Drive, creating a strong street presence, while still maximizing exterior gathering areas.

In terms of potential massing options for the Community Center's new construction, a vocabulary of sloped volumes might be utilized to unite the various volumes of programmatic space within. Building entries should be celebrated through generous overhangs, welcoming patrons to the center, while also providing covered outdoor space, creating a defined front porch condition in keeping with the front yard concept of the site.

Sited next to the community center, just below the Harriet Tubman House, the new Early Childhood Education Center building will have direct connections to the Marin Learning Center across the street, as well as Rocky Graham Park to the northeast. The concept is that the outdoor play yard will be protected by the L shape of the building, which will contain two wings of classrooms and a central lobby oriented towards the street and adjacent parking lot.

Future Phase

The Future Phase of the master plan will include demolishing the renovated portion of the community center, and constructing a new, two-story community center extending off the CSD offices and gym. Increased to 33,165 square feet of space, the Future Phase Community Center will also include the option for a 7,700 square foot indoor pool, bringing the facility to a total of 40,865 square feet. Nestled into the hillside, the indoor pool will be located roughly in the same location as the former multipurpose room. The enlarged Future Phase center will maintain its strong street presence along Phillips Drive, shaping a continuous front court along the entire building face.

THE NEW COMMUNITY CENTER CAMPUS – PATRON/STAFF EXPERIENCE AND PROGRAM ORGANIZATION


### **Community Center**

Visitors entering the new Community Center from the front plaza will be welcomed into a light-filled lobby with direct views through the building. The lobby will be part of the new construction added to the front of the former gymnasium, and will serve as the central core of the transformed facility. Diagrammatically, the lobby serves as an anchor to the two main circulation paths extending through the facility, which forms an L shape of internal circulation. Included within the lobby square footage is the "community living room" or lounge that will serve as an informal gathering area for Marin City residents, both young and old. Located off the lobby and lounge is a meeting room that is will cater to both CSD office use and also operate as a rentable space for community members. Also included in the new addition are the CSD offices, located next to the lobby and lounge, with a central service desk that maintains views into both wings of the building.

Programmatically, the new Community Center will be organized into two distinct areas. Moving through the new lobby into the renovated portion of the former Manzanita Center, this reconfigured area will contain the inter-generational activity spaces. The former gymnasium space will be subdivided to create a 3,500 square feet multi-purpose space offering a dining occupancy of over 200 guests for weddings, quinceañeras, and other revenue-generating events. This multipurpose room will have a primary indoor-outdoor connection to a protected courtyard, allowing for events to spill out to an outdoor seating and BBQ area.

The remaining portion of the former gym and lobby is comprised of two 900-square foot classrooms. Immediately adjacent to the multi-purpose room is the "Maker Space" or "Creator Space," which is foreseen as a technology lab, offering patrons a flexible classroom for creating, inventing, and learning. Inclusive to the Maker Space is the infrastructure for power and data, as well as the ability to accommodate various forms of technology, from laptop computers to 3-D printers. The additional classroom would operate as a more traditional training classroom for lectures, meetings, and other programs.

The existing inefficient kitchen in the former Manzanita Center will be completely remodeled and expanded to provide for a functional 620-square feet catering kitchen. Ideally situated directly adjacent to the multipurpose room and the outdoor courtyard, the new kitchen should be equipped to serve any large scale event within those spaces. The kitchen also has the exciting potential to serve the community center as an informal snack bar, with a bar-height counter and stools oriented along the main circulation space.

Continuing from the lobby in the opposite direction will be the recreational area of the Community Center, which will include the new gymnasium addition as well as the remodeled fitness and boxing areas. The 12,075 gym will contain a high-school sized full court, as well as two divisible small play courts. Sufficient sidelines allow for two separate bleacher areas, promoting the gym as a "destination gym" for tournament use by CYO basketball and other sports programs. Dedicated gym restrooms, office, and storage will also complement the new gym. Encouraging flexible modes of operation, the gym will be served by its own lobby space, which will connect directly to the main circulation path of the Community Center through a set of lockable doors. During the normal Community Center daytime hours, the exterior doors of the gym lobby could be secured, allowing intended users to pass through the main Community Center lobby and service desk. For after-hours and weekend use of the gym, the doors from the gym lobby to the Community Center corridor could be locked. Outdoor connections from the gym to the campus should also be provided, with large openings along the eastern wall oriented towards the Harriet Tubman House and Rocky Graham Park beyond, establishing a direct link between the campus' two main recreation hubs. A secondary exit from the gym to the rear courtyard space will provide a connection via a covered walkway to the multi-purpose room and kitchen.

### **Family Resource Center**

Housed in a portion of the former Senior Center, next to the Health and Wellness Center, the Family Resource Center will offer dedicated space for family counseling and education through small conference or consultation rooms and offices space.

### Harriet Tubman House

Included in the master plan is the framework for the preservation and renovation of the Harriet Tubman House. One of the remaining historic homes built in Marin City, the house is a lasting representation of Marin City's early beginnings. The Harriet Tubman house requires significant renovations to bring it up to current accessibility and building codes, as well as to address the many deferred maintenance issues. Once the upgrades are completed, possible uses of the Harriet Tubman House include offices for non-profit organizations, a historical heritage museum for Marin City, or a potential visitor's center for the surrounding headland trails. The master plan includes the improvements to the historic home in the initial Phase 1 budget.

### Additional Facilities for Partner Organizations

Also part of the Community Center campus is the Marin City Health and Wellness Center and the Early Childhood Education Center run by Community Action Marin. Currently, these spaces are leased from the Marin City CSD by the respective operating tenant organizations. The master plan intent is for these leased facilities to be a cohesive part of the campus upgrades, although their funding sources are not included in the core community center master plan budget. These projects have the potential to be funded separately through state or federal capital dollars, thus can be implemented separate from the core community center process.

### Health & Wellness Center

The existing Marguerita C. Johnson Center will be renovated to serve as the new home to the Marin City Health and Wellness Center, as well as allocate space for a Family Resource Center. The Health and Wellness clinic will significantly grow in size from its existing facility of roughly 1,850 square feet to 5,400 square feet to meet the increased patient demand. The updated space will include an enlarged waiting area, five medical examination rooms, four dental operatories, dedicated behavioral health exam rooms, as well as the necessary laboratory, staff, and storage spaces.

Both the Health and Wellness and adjacent Family Resource centers will maintain independent entries, in addition to dedicated parking spaces and drop-off/pick-up zones. Programmatically, the Health & Wellness Center will operate independently from the rest of the campus situated in the former Senior Center, away from the more active programming of the Community Center.

### Early Childhood Education Center

The master plan calls for the new Early Childhood Education Center to contain a total of three 900-square foot classrooms, in addition to a smaller, dedicated classroom for infant care. The classrooms will be dispersed between two wings, which form an L-shaped building footprint, with the lobby, staff offices, kitchenette, and restrooms concentrated at the center of the two wings. The outdoor play yard should be sheltered and protected by the building wings.



### Future Phase

The Future Phase community center will maintain a centralized lobby, with the main circulation space similarly organized in an L shape. The multipurpose room in the Future Phase will be replaced with a larger, 4,500 square foot space, anchoring one end of the building, with direct outdoor connections to the front plaza and access to the parking lot. The remaining ground floor will be comprised of new fitness and boxing spaces, in addition to the indoor pool to the rear. As mentioned, the CSD offices, meeting room, and gym would remain in their Phase 1 and 2 locations. A second story would provide space for two training classrooms, as well as a larger 1,200 square foot "Maker Space." From the second floor, expansive views would be offered to Marin City and the surrounding headlands.




Future Phase conceptual building plan

### THE NEW COMMUNITY CENTER - SUSTAINABLE STRATEGIES

The new Community Center will incorporate best-practice sustainable design strategies. Site sustainability includes a holistic approaches to hydrology, utilizing a combination of infiltration ponds, bioswales, pervious paving, and underground cisterns to mitigate or collect site and building runoff. Native and drought-resistant plantings should be used throughout the site, and where applicable, the building footprint should endeavor to preserve existing trees or vegetation. Additionally, the facilities should strive for reduced energy consumption through an integrated sustainable design approach. Through a detailed study of the site, energy reduction should be optimized through a deliberate and rigorous approach to building systems, window locations, orientation, and solar shading designs. All new and renovated facilities will meet the state's new "California Green" building code requirements for energy efficiency. The opportunities to pursue LEED construction will be evaluated on a building by building case, but all the projects will incorporate sustainable building practices, such as minimizing site construction waste, specifying recycled and renewable products, and designing for optimal user comfort with the use of daylighting and views. These strategies will be further developed during future architectural design phases.

# MARIN CITY COMMUNITY CENTER MASTER PLAN - CONCLUSION

The Marin City Community Center project will provide necessary infrastructural improvements and expanded program options to serve the current and future recreational needs of Marin City residents. Furthermore, the Community Center master plan will strengthen the connectivity to surrounding civic facilities, establishing a new campus and centralized cultural destination for Marin City. Current vehicular and parking issues will be improved and alleviated through the redevelopment of Phillips Drive, expanded Community Center parking lot, and shared-use parking agreements. The building itself will accommodate for the growth and development of the Marin City CSD, partner, and district tenants within the new Community Center. Lastly, the phasing options and flexibility of programmed spaces within the center will ensure that the facility meets the established Core Principles, and addresses present and future needs of all Marin City and surrounding area residents.




Site hydrology diagram

#### WHAT IS A MASTER PLAN?

The Marin City Community Center Master Plan defines the framework and near and long-term vision for the Marin City Community Center. The recommendations of the Master Plan are based on analyzing the recreational needs of the community, best practices and future trends of community centers, as well as an assessment of the existing facility.

The vision and recommendations of the Master Plan have been developed with the Marin City community through an engaging, open and participatory process. The six Core Principles define the vision and parameters of the project, the Marin City Community Center Master Plan will create a pragmatic, implementable master plan that responds to the needs and goals of the community of Marin City.

#### MASTER PLAN PARTICIPANT GROUPS

#### PROJECT MANAGEMENT TEAM (PMT):

The Project Management Team (PMT) was comprised of the Marin City CSD General Manager; the project architects, Group 4, Architecture, Research + Planning; the construction manager, Mack 5; and a fund raising consultant with Partnership Resources Group. The Project Management Team met regularly to develop initial program, building, site and parking options to review with constituent groups ranging from the Marin City CSD Board, to the Steering Committee, to Focus Groups, to the community-at-large.

#### MARIN CITY CSD BOARD (MCCSD):

Throughout the master plan process, the PMT presented project updates to the Marin City CSD Board during their monthly Board Meetings. During these updates, key project developments were reviewed with Board Members for their review, comment, feedback, and guidance. A total of seven board updates were conducted over the course of the master plan.

#### STEERING COMMITTEE (SC):

The Marin City Community Center Project Steering Committee was comprised of a combination of community stakeholders and involved individuals from the surrounding region that provided project oversight as well as county-wide visibility and know-how. The Steering Committee served as a liaison to the Marin City CSD Board and served to guide the PMT, providing feedback to master plan component options that were reviewed with the community-at-large. Four task forces or subcommittees within the overall Steering Committee gave further direction during the master plan process. These task forces included the following groups:

- Program, Operations and Business Planning
- Facility Design

### MASTER PLAN PROCESS

- Capital Finance and Fundraising Objectives
- Communications and Community Engagement

### FOCUS GROUPS:

Focus groups consisted of a wide array of users, partners and stakeholders who use the Marin City Community Center. Throughout the master plan process, these focus groups met with the PMT to discuss their current usage of the center's spaces and their goals for a new facility. These groups included :
